


Town of Clarkstown

(2015) - The Town of Clarkstown was recognized for being the first municipality in the state to install a large-scale solar panel array atop a closed landfill and the first municipality in Rockland to make compost consisting of decayed organic material available to its residents for use as plant fertilizer and land conditioning at no charge. Additionally, the Town was recognized for creating a concrete and asphalt crushing facility at the Clarkstown Transfer Station.


