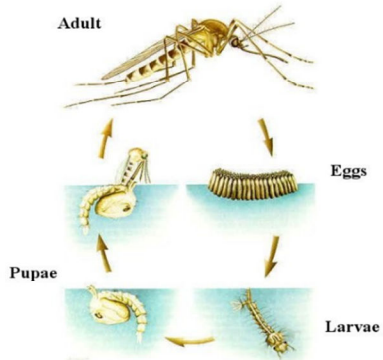


Are there MOSQUITOES in your yard?

Mosquitoes are known all over the world for their itchy "bites." They are also known for spreading diseases.

- There are over 3,000 known species of mosquitoes worldwide & about 60 different species in NY State!
- Female mosquitoes lay their eggs near or in stagnant water; even very shallow puddles are suitable.
- Like other flies, they go through four life stages: egg, larva, pupa & adult.

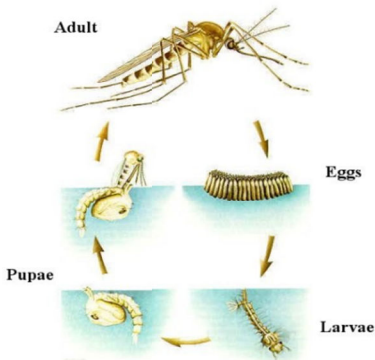

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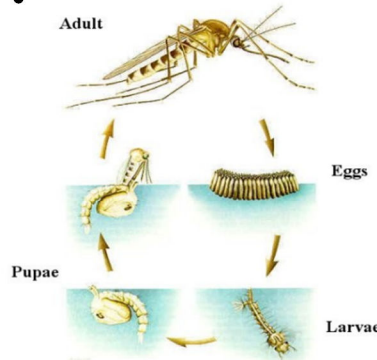


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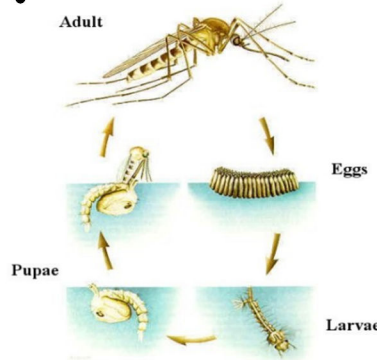


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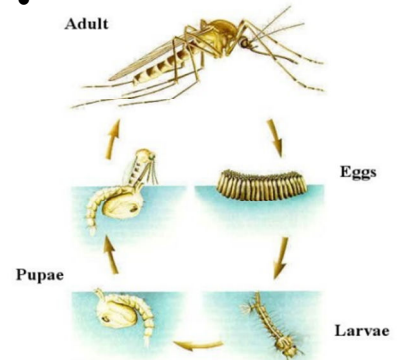


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Want to Hunt for Mosquitoes?

Mosquitoes grow up in standing water around your house and can potentially make you sick?

This is what mosquito larvae look like.




Some common containers

that hold water and can breed mosquitoes are:

- Bird Baths 
- Toys 
- Flower Pots and Bases
- Pets Water Dishes
- Even small items like cups and bottle caps!

Hunt for mosquitoes by

 checking for water in outside containers at least once a week. Get rid of the items or empty the water out and scrub the container.

Did you know?

According to Rutgers University 1 birdbath can produce over 400,000 mosquitoes in a single summer!



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
